The Parable of the Loving Father and His Two Lost Sons

Scripture: Luke 15

Also: Proverbs 18:24

Questions

- 1. What has challenged you, changed you or confused you from this week's sermon or the Scriptures in it?
- 2. In the opening verses of the chapter (Luke 15:1-2), Luke distinguishes between two groups of people: those who want to be near Jesus (the "sinners"), and those who grumble about Jesus' relationship with those people who want to be near Him.
 - Which group would you place yourself in? Why?
 - The Pharisees and scribes (those considered to be religious/righteous) who were grumbling about Jesus' relationship with those they considered sinners didn't realize that everyone Jesus had a relationship with was a sinner!
 - How do you react to that statement (that we're all sinners)? Why?
 - Who would the Pharisees and scribes grumble about in your relationship sphere?
- 3. In Luke 15: 11-32, two sons are described. Do you gravitate towards being like one or the other (rebellious or religious)? Why?
- 4. Read the rest of Luke 15
 - What was Jesus trying to communicate through these three parables?
 - What does it teach us about what God values?
 - Where do your values match God's? Where are they mismatched?
- 5. Who would you tend to view as "tax collectors and sinners"?
 - For instance, terrorists, criminals, those who vote differently than you, individuals who view human sexuality differently immigrants, the prideful, the closed-minded, those highly or lowly educated, the poor, etc?
 - Do you know anyone who is like that?
- 6. Do you give yourself the same grace that the father in the story gave the younger son who left?
- 7. Who is the Holy Spirit nudging you to love extravagantly this week?
