## The Master's Touch

Scripture: Mark 1:35-45

Also: Mark 10:45

## Questions

- 1. What has challenged you, changed you or confused you from this week's sermon or the Scriptures in it?
- 2. Read Mark 1:35. This can be one of those cliche places where Christians are shamed into getting up earlier to pray more. Without doing that,
  - What can be learned about Jesus' example of prayer here?
  - o How must Jesus have viewed prayer to be so devoted to it?
- 3. Read Mark 1:37-38. What depth of purpose must Jesus have had, to not be a people pleaser, but instead, to choose to go elsewhere to fulfill His mission? (Jesus was essentially saying "No" to the people's request to see Him.)
  - What does that tell us about God's character?
  - What does that tell us about His character in contrast with culture?
  - o Do you have the freedom to say "No" to people? If so, is it for purposeful reasons?
  - o Do you resonate with the depth of purpose Jesus displayed? Why or why not?
  - o Do you feel like you could have that depth of purpose?
- 4. Read Mark 1:40-42.
  - Have you ever sought Jesus' touch (figuratively of course)?
  - What happened?
  - o Is there a place in your life you need his touch now?
- 5. Read Mark 1:43-45. The leper was so excited that he wanted to, and did, declare to everyone what Jesus had done. This seems like a good, biblical thing to do! But Jesus had instructed Him not to.
  - Have you encountered a time in your life where the path of obedience didn't make sense?
  - What did you do, and how did it turn out?
  - Can we always understand God's instructions?
  - Can we always link our actions directly to the outcomes that occur afterwards? (No: right action/obedience doesn't always yield pleasant results, and wrong action/disobedience doesn't always yield negative results.)
  - What does this teach us about trust and obedience?

Pray for increased trust and obedience for each other, our church family, our community, and our world.
